
Plymouth Congregational Church Minneapolis, Minnesota



One hundred and eight years at 1900 Nicollet Avenue

March nineteenth two thousand and seventeen Third Sunday in Lent The structure which now becomes the home of Plymouth Church is the fourth it has occupied in the fifty-two years of its history. Two were erected on the corner of Nicollet avenue and Fourth street. The third, which so long stood at Nicollet and Eighth, was vacated June 20th, 1907.

The first definite action looking towards the erection of this building was a vote at the annual Society meeting, October 23, 1906, to purchase the site. On November 22nd, the Society voted to sell the Eighth street property, and appointed a committee on plans and building. After wide inquiry and careful investigation, this committee selected Shepley, Rutan & Coolidge of Boston as architects. Their skill and artistic sense in the treatment of every detail has resulted in a complete and harmonious whole. After a thorough study of the requirements, plans were adopted and approved by the Society. The general contract was let to J. & W. A. Elliott Co., who broke ground for the new building July 19, 1907. Work was suspended during the following winter. The corner stone was laid April 29, 1908. The Chapel was completed and occupied October 18th of the same year. The construction has been in charge of Mr. Jerome Paul Jackson.

The building has an extreme length of 210 feet and a depth of 186 feet. Architecturally, it is a type of early English Gothic, distinguished by low pointed arches. The outer walls, of seam-faced granite from St. Cloud, rest upon concrete foundations. The auditorium, 74 x 96 in size, is cruciform in shape. The nave and transepts, with gallery over the wide vestibule at the rear, afford seating space for about 1,000. The chancel is occupied by the pulpit platform, choir space and organ. The room is open to the roof, which is supported by heavy moulded timber trusses. The interior finish throughout is in brown oak, and the organ screen is elaborately carved. The four manual organ, built by the E. M. Skinner Co. of Boston, is divided, one portion on each side the chancel, with an antiphonal organ and chimes in the upper tower room at the rear.

The chancel window, typifying "Worship," designed and executed by The Robert L. Dodge Company of New York, is intended to represent and take the place of windows in the old church, and be a memorial to those for whom they were given. A scheme of related subjects and of the manner of their treatment for the other windows, some of which have already been promised as memorials, has been adopted.

The site and building, with organ and furnishings complete, have cost approximately \$250,000.

Acknowledgment is due and is gratefully made to the firms above mentioned for their efficient performance of the works entrusted to them, to Mr. Jackson, our superintending architect, whose thorough knowledge and artistic sense, together with constant and faithful attention to his task, has been so highly valued, and to the many designers, builders and workmen who have labored to effect the completion of the edifice.
